



Greetings,

Thank you for taking a moment to look through our 2024 Community Impact Report. I myself am quite grateful at the opportunity to reflect because I hardly remember what I had for breakfast this morning, let alone everything that happened at the library last year. (Donuts. It was donuts.)

2024 was filled with big moments for our library! Witnessing Livingston County Libraries at the forefront of education and programming as the entire region came together for the Total Solar Eclipse was a distinct, once-in-a-lifetime honor.



I was equally thrilled to represent the library at the LivCo Special Education & Disability Resource Fair, organized by our Library Board Vice President Becky Stewart, for the second year in a row. I also watched with overwhelming pride as my colleagues stepped out of their comfort zones to offer new programs and services at the library; Kasey's Birth Stories event, Pamela's Wellness Series, and Colleen's Harm Reduction & Mental Health Resources are just a few examples.

This year, there's another big moment happening in libraries, one that causes whiplash when considered against the amazing things coming from even our small corner of the library world. At the time of this writing, the executive order eliminating the only federal agency dedicated to library funding has been temporarily halted. Without nonstop advocacy and legal action, however, federal cuts are likely to continue. Those most affected will, of course, be small, rural communities. Among the arguments in favor of these cuts is the notion that we must get rid of "luxuries" during tough financial times.

To those who call libraries a luxury, I would invite you to talk to the new parents working with lactation counselors during our Positive Expressions program, the elders who receive digital literacy training to use their smartphones in a world that demands they be online, or the folks who have saved hundreds, if not thousands of dollars each year by borrowing materials from the library. As acclaimed librarian and advocate Eleanor Crumblehulme said, "Cutting libraries during a recession is like cutting hospitals during a plague."

Libraries, above all else, build community, and community is not a luxury; community is vital. I feel incredibly fortunate to see that vitality in the library and around Avon every day, in the big moments and in the simple daily interactions.

So much with libraries is uncertain right now. However, as we move forward, I am confident that the sound fiscal oversight and governance of our Library Board of Trustees, along with the support of the Town and Village of Avon, the OWWL Library System, our ridiculously amazing staff, and YOU - we will have the opportunity to create a sustainable future for the critical resources provided by the Avon Free Library.

Stay tuned for important updates coming later in 2025, and thank you for your continued support of the library and community.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS

WARMING CENTER & COOLING CENTER

The Avon Free Library played a crucial role as a warming and cooling center during the past year, providing a safe, accessible space for individuals to seek shelter from extreme temperatures. The library offered essential relief, especially for vulnerable populations who may lack other resources during inclement weather. Free coffee, tea, and hot cocoa were also made available to patrons all winter long, thanks to the Sit N' Knit group and Friends of the Avon Free Library.





ECLIPSE CELEBRATION

The library played an active role in the community's celebration of the solar eclipse. It served as a pickup location for free solar glasses, ensuring safe viewing for all. The library also hosted student poster board presentations and offered several educational programs to help deepen the public's understanding of the eclipse, providing valuable resources and learning opportunities for everyone to engage with this astronomical phenomenon.

NEW PROGRAMMING

445 programs were held at the Avon Free Library in 2024, with over 4,900 attendees! New programs included Zumba, Bingo, a Self-Publishing Seminar, Wellness Classes, Life-Sized Clue, Bottle Rockets for Teens, Yoga, Birth Stories, and many more. We were particularly proud of our increased engagement among teens as well as our promotion of mental & physical wellbeing for everyone! The library also received 1,298 packs of diapers and \$500 from the Interfaith Council which were given to the Avon Food Pantry during the Great Give Back!






INCREASED PARTNERSHIPS





For over one hundred years, the Avon Free Library has played a crucial role in our community, evolving far beyond just providing books. The library is a place for discovery, creativity, inclusivity, and lifelong learning. It is a common ground where people of all ages, ethnicities, and socioeconomic means can find the resources and support that they need to succeed, all at no cost.

As the role of our library evolves, we must support its physical presence to ensure that it can continue to meet the needs of our community. A capital plan was created after assessing the building's physical needs, as well as the needs and wants of community members. Safety, accessibility, sustainability of the building, and expanded community and educational space are the focuses of the plan.

SLATE ROOF REPLACEMENT

The current slate roof on the library is nearing its 100th year and is starting to deteriorate. Its replacement is vital to protect the building and all of its contents.



Funded primarily through state construction funds, grants, and Town of Avon support, the new slate roof will outlive all of us and is a gift to future generations.

BACK YARD & PARKING LOT

The backyard will be transformed into a multipurpose space where patrons can gather, work, study, and play. Visitors can access 24/7 wifi, stroll along the paths, gather and connect with each other while relaxing on a shaded bench, enjoy programs in the pavilion, and interact with the different experiential spaces in the garden. The sensory rich environment is especially beneficial for mental health and for community members who are neurodivergent or who experience dementia.

Interactive learning spaces within the yard include:

- Geological Rock Garden
- Pollinator Garden
- Pavilion with Amphitheater Area
- Birdhouse and Nature ID Area
- Rain Garden Wetland Learning Experience

The project also includes paving the current gravel parking lot behind the library which currently poses many safety and accessibility challenges.
